Types of Advisory Services

ASSET MANAGEMENT

RFA offers discretionary asset management services to advisory Clients. RFA will offer Clients ongoing asset management services through determining individual investment goals, time horizons, objectives, and risk tolerance. Investment strategies, investment selection, asset allocation, portfolio monitoring and the overall investment program will be based on the above factors. The Client will authorize RFA discretionary authority to execute selected investment program transactions as stated within the Investment Advisory Agreement.

Orion Portfolio Solutions

RFA offers discretionary management services through a program sponsored by Orion Portfolio Solutions ("OPS"). The terms and conditions under which the Client shall engage Orion Portfolio Solutions shall be set forth in separate written agreements between (1) the Client and RFA and (2) the Client and Orion Portfolio Solutions. RFA shall continue to render advisory services to the Client relative to the ongoing monitoring and review of account performance, for which RFA shall receive an annual advisory fee which is based upon a percentage of the market value of the assets being managed by Orion Portfolio Solutions. Factors that RFA shall consider in recommending Orion Portfolio Solutions include the Client's stated investment objective(s), management style, performance, reputation, financial strength, reporting, pricing, and research. In addition to RFA's written disclosure statement, the Client shall also receive the written disclosure statement of Orion Portfolio Solutions. Clients should review Orion Portfolio Solutions' ADV Part 2 or Terms of Use for additional details regarding services.

FINANCIAL PLANNING AND CONSULTING

RFA offers the following financial planning and consulting services as outlined below:

Full Financial Plan

Financial planning services include a complete evaluation of an investor's current and future financial state and will be provided by using currently known variables to predict future cash flows, asset values and withdrawal plans. RFA will use current net worth, tax liabilities, asset allocation, and future retirement and estate plans in developing financial plans.

Typical topics reviewed in a financial plan may include but are not limited to:

- **Financial goals:** Based on an individual's or a family's clearly defined financial goals, including funding a college education for the children, buying a larger home, starting a business, retiring on time or leaving a legacy. Financial goals should be quantified and set to milestones for tracking.

- **Personal net worth statement:** A snapshot of assets and liabilities serves as a benchmark for measuring progress towards financial goals.
- **Cash flow analysis:** An income and spending plan determines how much can be set aside for debt repayment, savings and investing each month.
- **Retirement strategy:** A strategy for achieving retirement independent of other financial priorities. Including a strategy for accumulating the required retirement capital and its planned lifetime distribution.
- **Comprehensive risk management plan:** Identify all risk exposures and provide the necessary coverage to protect the family and its assets against financial loss. The risk management plan includes a full review of life and disability insurance, personal liability coverage, property and casualty coverage, and catastrophic coverage.
- **Long-term investment plan:** Include a customized asset allocation strategy based on specific investment objectives and a risk profile. This investment plan sets guidelines for selecting, buying and selling investments and establishing benchmarks for performance review.
- **Tax reduction strategy:** Identify ways to minimize taxes on personal income to the extent permissible by the tax code. The strategy should include identification of tax-favored investment vehicles that can reduce taxation of investment income.
- **Estate preservation:** Help update accounts, review beneficiaries for retirement accounts and life insurance, provide a second look at your current estate planning documents, and prompt you to update your plan when the legal environment changes or you have major life events such as a marriage, death, or births.

Consultation Services

Item 5: Fees and Compensation

Method of Compensation and Fee Schedule

ASSET MANAGEMENT

RFA offers discretionary direct asset management services to advisory Clients. RFA charges an annual investment advisory fee based on the total assets under management as follows:

The annual fee is negotiable based upon certain criteria (e.g., historical relationship, type of assets, anticipated future earning capacity, anticipated future additional assets, dollar amounts of assets to be managed, related accounts, account composition, negotiations with Clients, etc.). Fees are billed monthly in arrears based on an average daily balance of the account for the previous month. The calculation for the average daily balance is based on the formula $(A/D) \times (F/P)$.

A = the sum of the daily balances in the billing period

D = number of days in the billing period

F = annual management fee

P = number of billing periods per year

Step 1: Based on monthly billing cycle: Calculate the average of the values of the Client's account over the course of the entire month to determine the average daily balance.

Step 2: Calculate the annual fee: $\$596,343.20 \times 0.80\% (F) = \$4,770.74$

Step 3: Determine the monthly fee: $\$4,770.74/12 (P) = \397.56 Orion Portfolio Solutions

RFA charges an annual investment advisory fee based on the total assets under management as indicated above. The annual fee is negotiable. Accounts within the same household may be combined for a reduced fee. Lower fees for comparable services may be available from other sources.

The investment management fees charged by OPS are exclusive of, and in addition to, RFA's investment advisory fee set forth above. OPS does not receive any portion of the advisory fee charged by RFA. The fees are charged monthly in arrears and are based on the average daily account balance for the period for the prior month.

Fees for OPS are as follows:

- Administration Fees (reporting and accounting services – ranging from 0.08% - 0.45%),
- Account Maintenance Fees (\$25 or \$50 per account annually),
- Strategist Fees (range from 0.0% to 0.20%), and
- Separately Managed Account (SMA) Fees (range from 0.35% to 0.70%).

Fees are automatically deducted from the Client's account by OPS and OPS will pay RFA their portion of the fees. RFA does not have the ability to directly deduct their advisory fee from the Client account.

If margin is utilized, the fees will be billed based on the net asset value of the account. Lower fees for comparable services may be available from other sources. Clients may terminate their account within five (5) business days of signing the Investment Advisory Agreement with no obligation and without penalty. After the initial five (5) business days, the agreement may be terminated by RFA with thirty (30) days written notice to Client and by the Client at any time with written notice to RFA. For accounts opened or closed mid-billing period, fees will be prorated based on the days services are provided during the given period. All unpaid earned fees will be due to RFA. Client shall be given thirty (30) days prior written notice of any increase in fees. Any increase in fees will be acknowledged in writing by both parties before any increase in said fees occurs.

FINANCIAL PLANNING AND CONSULTING

RFA charges a fixed fee based on complexity and unique Client needs for financial planning. Prior to the planning process the Client will be provided an estimated plan fee.

FIXED FEES

Financial Planning Services are offered based on a flat fee between \$750 and \$4,000 and are negotiable.

Fees for financial plans are due upon commencement of the Advisory Agreement.

Services are completed and delivered inside of thirty (30) days contingent upon timely delivery of all required documentation. Client cancellations shall be made in writing to RFA. Client may cancel within five (5) business days of signing Agreement with no obligation and without penalty. If the Client cancels after five (5) business days, all fees will be

refunded to the Client in the same manner in which the fee was paid (e.g. refunded to client account, check, electronic payment).

Client Payment of Fees

Fees for asset management services are:

- Deducted from a designated Client account. The Client must consent in advance to direct debiting of their investment account.
- Check – to be remitted by Client to RFA
- Electronic Payment via ACH, Debit Card, or Credit Card (fees will be paid via a third party payment processor in which the client will securely input payment information and pay the advisory fee through a secure portal. RFA will not have continuous access to the Client's banking information.)

Fees for financial plans will be billed:

- Deducted from a designated non-qualified Client account. The Client must consent in advance to direct debiting of their investment account.
 - Check – to be remitted by Client to RFA
 - Electronic Payment via ACH, Debit Card, or Credit Card (fees will be paid via a third party payment processor in which the client will securely input payment information and pay the advisory fee through a secure portal. RFA will not have continuous access to the Client's banking information.)
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Additional Client Fees Charged

Custodians may charge transaction fees and other related costs on the purchases or sales of mutual funds, equities, bonds, options and exchange-traded funds. Mutual funds, money market funds and exchange-traded funds also charge internal management fees, which are disclosed in the fund's prospectus. Margin interest may also apply for Client electing to utilize margin on their account(s). RFA does not receive any compensation from these fees. All of these fees are in addition to the management fee you pay to RFA. For more details on the brokerage practices, see Item 12 of this brochure.

Prepayment of Client Fees

RFA does not require any prepayment of fees of more than \$500 per Client and six months or more in advance.

Fees for financial plans are due, in full, at the commencement of the contract.

If the Client cancels after five (5) business days, any unearned fees will be refunded to the Client, or any unpaid earned fees will be due to RFA.

External Compensation for the Sale of Securities to Clients

Investment Advisor Representatives of RFA receive external compensation from sales of investment related products such as insurance as licensed insurance agents. This represents a conflict of interest because it gives an incentive to recommend products based on the commission received. This conflict is mitigated by disclosures, procedures, and RFA's fiduciary obligation to place the best interest of the Client first and Clients are not required to purchase any products or services. Clients have the option to purchase these products through another insurance agent of their choosing.

Item 6: Performance-Based Fees and Side-by-Side Management

Sharing of Capital Gains

Fees are not based on a share of the capital gains or capital appreciation of managed securities.

RFA does not use a performance-based fee structure because of the conflict of interest. Performance based compensation may create an incentive for RFA to recommend an investment that may carry a higher degree of risk to the Client.

Item 7: Types of Clients

Description

RFA generally provides investment advice to individuals and high net worth individuals. Client relationships vary in scope and length of service.

Account Minimums

RFA does not require a minimum to open or maintain an account.

Item 8: Methods of Analysis, Investment Strategies and Risk of Loss

Methods of Analysis

Security analysis methods may include Modern Portfolio Theory and Monte Carlo. Investing in securities involves risk of loss that Clients should be prepared to bear. Past performance is not a guarantee of future returns.

Modern Portfolio Theory is the theory of finance that attempts to maximize portfolio expected return for a given amount of portfolio risk, or equivalently minimize risk for a given level of expected return, by carefully choosing the proportions of various assets. Modern Portfolio Theory assumes investors are risk averse which means when given two assets with the same expected return the investor will choose the less risky one. An investor is only willing to take more risk if the expected return is greater. Therefore, Modern Portfolio Theory aims to construct a portfolio of investments that has the best possible expected return for the level of risk.

RFA may use principles of Modern Portfolio Theory ("MPT") as part of the investment analysis and portfolio construction process. MPT is an investment framework that seeks to optimize portfolio returns for a given level of risk through asset allocation and diversification. While MPT is widely used, it involves certain assumptions and limitations, and its use involves risk.

MPT relies on historical and statistical data, including estimates of expected returns, variances, and correlations among asset classes. These estimates are inherently uncertain and are based on assumptions about future market behavior that may not prove accurate. Actual market conditions may differ materially from historical patterns, and correlations among asset classes may change unexpectedly, particularly during periods of market stress.

MPT assumes that markets are generally efficient and that asset prices reflect all available information. To the extent markets are not efficient, or investor behavior deviates from rational assumptions, portfolios constructed using MPT may not perform as expected.

The diversification benefits expected under MPT may not be realized. During periods of market volatility or systemic events, asset classes that are normally uncorrelated may experience simultaneous declines, resulting in losses across a diversified portfolio.

MPT also does not eliminate the risk of loss. Portfolios constructed using MPT may experience significant short-term or long-term losses, including the loss of principal. There is no guarantee that a portfolio constructed using MPT will achieve its investment objectives or outperform other investment strategies.

In addition, MPT focuses primarily on quantitative factors and may not fully account for qualitative considerations, behavioral factors, or unforeseen economic, political, or market events. The application of MPT requires judgment in selecting assumptions and inputs, and different assumptions may lead to different portfolio outcomes.

Clients should understand that all investing involves risk, and no investment methodology, including MPT, can assure a profit or protect against loss in all market conditions.

Monte Carlo planning technique is used to calculate the percentage probability of specific scenarios that are based upon a set group of assumptions and standard deviations. This method of calculation has often been used in investment and retirement planning to project the likelihood of achieving one's financial or retirement goals and whether or not a retiree will have enough income to live on for life, given a wide range of possible outcomes in the markets. While there are no absolute parameters for this type of projection, the underlying assumptions for these calculations typically include such factors as interest rates, the client's age and projected time to retirement, the amount of the investment portfolio that is spent or withdrawn each year and the portfolio allocation.

RFA may use Monte Carlo simulations as part of the investment analysis and financial planning process. Monte Carlo analysis is a statistical modeling technique that uses randomized variables and probability assumptions to estimate a range of potential future outcomes. While this analysis can be a useful planning tool, it involves inherent limitations and risks.

Monte Carlo simulations rely on assumptions regarding future rates of return, volatility, correlations, inflation, withdrawal rates, and other factors. These assumptions are based on historical data, current market conditions, and professional judgment, all of which may not accurately predict future results. Changes in assumptions can materially affect projected outcomes.

The results of a Monte Carlo simulation are hypothetical in nature and do not represent actual investment performance. Projected outcomes should not be interpreted as guarantees of future results or as assurances that specific investment objectives will be achieved. Actual investment performance and financial outcomes may differ significantly from modeled projections.

Monte Carlo analysis may underestimate or fail to account for extreme or unforeseen market events, such as periods of prolonged market stress, rapid changes in economic conditions, or systemic risks. Market behavior during such events may differ materially from the assumptions used in the model.

Monte Carlo simulations also may not fully reflect real-world factors such as transaction costs, taxes, changes in client behavior, liquidity constraints, regulatory changes, or

unexpected life events. In addition, the analysis may assume a consistent investment strategy over time, which may not reflect actual portfolio management decisions.

The usefulness of Monte Carlo analysis is dependent on the quality and accuracy of the data and assumptions used. Errors in data, limitations of the model, or incorrect assumptions may lead to misleading or overly optimistic results.

Investment Strategy

The investment strategy for a specific Client is based upon the objectives stated by the Client during consultations. The Client may change these objectives at any time by providing written notice to RFA. Each Client executes a Client profile form or similar form that documents their objectives and their desired investment strategy.

Other strategies may include long-term purchases, short-term purchases, and option writing (including covered options, uncovered options or spreading strategies).

Security Specific Material Risks

All investment programs have certain risks that are borne by the investor. Our investment approach constantly keeps the risk of loss in mind. Investors face the following investment risks and should discuss these risks with RFA:

- *Market Risk:* The prices of securities in which clients invest may decline in response to certain events taking place around the world, including those directly involving the companies whose securities are owned by a fund; conditions affecting the general economy; overall market changes; local, regional or global political, social or economic instability; and currency, interest rate and commodity price fluctuations. Investors should have a long-term perspective and be able to tolerate potentially sharp declines in market value.
- *Interest-rate Risk:* Fluctuations in interest rates may cause investment prices to fluctuate. For example, when interest rates rise, yields on existing bonds become less attractive, causing their market values to decline.
- *Inflation Risk:* When any type of inflation is present, a dollar today will buy more than a dollar next year, because purchasing power is eroding at the rate of inflation.
- *Currency Risk:* Overseas investments are subject to fluctuations in the value of the dollar against the currency of the investment's originating country. This is also referred to as exchange rate risk.
- *Reinvestment Risk:* This is the risk that future proceeds from investments may have to be reinvested at a potentially lower rate of return (i.e. interest rate). This primarily relates to fixed income securities.
- *Liquidity Risk:* Liquidity is the ability to readily convert an investment into cash. Generally, assets are more liquid if many traders are interested in a standardized product. For example, Treasury Bills are highly liquid, while real estate properties are not.
- *Management Risk:* The advisor's investment approach may fail to produce the intended results. If the advisor's assumptions regarding the performance of a specific asset class or fund are not realized in the expected time frame, the overall performance of the client's portfolio may suffer.

- *Equity Risk:* Equity securities tend to be more volatile than other investment choices. The value of an individual mutual fund or ETF can be more volatile than the market as a whole. This volatility affects the value of the client's overall portfolio. Small- and mid-cap companies are subject to additional risks. Smaller companies may experience greater volatility, higher failure rates, more limited markets, product lines, financial resources, and less management experience than larger companies. Smaller companies may also have a lower trading volume, which may disproportionately affect their market price, tending to make them fall more in response to selling pressure than is the case with larger companies.
- *Fixed Income Risk:* The issuer of a fixed income security may not be able to make interest and principal payments when due. Generally, the lower the credit rating of a security, the greater the risk that the issuer will default on its obligation. If a rating agency gives a debt security a lower rating, the value of the debt security will decline because investors will demand a higher rate of return. As nominal interest rates rise, the value of fixed income securities held by a fund is likely to decrease. A nominal interest rate is the sum of a real interest rate and an expected inflation rate.
- *Investment Companies Risk:* When a client invests in open end mutual funds or ETFs, the client indirectly bears their proportionate share of any fees and expenses payable directly by those funds. Therefore, the client will incur higher expenses, which may be duplicative. In addition, the client's overall portfolio may be affected by losses of an underlying fund and the level of risk arising from the investment practices of an underlying fund (such as the use of derivatives). ETFs are also subject to the following risks: (i) an ETF's shares may trade at a market price that is above or below their net asset value or (ii) trading of an ETF's shares may be halted if the listing exchange's officials deem such action appropriate, the shares are de-listed from the exchange, or the activation of market-wide "circuit breakers" (which are tied to large decreases in stock prices) halts stock trading generally. Adviser has no control over the risks taken by the underlying funds in which client invests.
- *Cash and Cash Equivalents Risk:* Cash and cash equivalents consist of investments like money market funds, certificates of deposit (CDs), Treasury bills, and short-term government bonds. They are generally considered low-risk compared to other asset classes. While they offer safety, liquidity, and stability, they come with certain risks, such as inflation, interest rate fluctuations, and opportunity costs.
- *Derivatives Risk:* Funds in a client's portfolio may use derivative instruments. The value of these derivative instruments derives from the value of an underlying asset, currency or index. Investments by a fund in such underlying funds may involve the risk that the value of the underlying fund's derivatives may rise or fall more rapidly than other investments, and the risk that an underlying fund may lose more than the amount that it invested in the derivative instrument in the first place. Derivative instruments also involve the risk that other parties to the derivative contract may fail to meet their obligations, which could cause losses.
- *Foreign Securities Risk:* Funds in which clients invest may invest in foreign securities. Foreign securities are subject to additional risks not typically associated with investments in domestic securities. These risks may include, among others, currency risk, country risks (political, diplomatic, regional conflicts, terrorism, war, social and economic instability, currency devaluations and policies that have the effect of limiting

or restricting foreign investment or the movement of assets), different trading practices, less government supervision, less publicly available information, limited trading markets and greater volatility. To the extent that underlying funds invest in issuers located in emerging markets, the risk may be heightened by political changes, changes in taxation, or currency controls that could adversely affect the values of these investments. Emerging markets have been more volatile than the markets of developed countries with more mature economies.

- *Long-term purchases:* Long-term investments are those vehicles purchased with the intention of being held for more than one year. Typically, the expectation of the investment is to increase in value so that it can eventually be sold for a profit. In addition, there may be an expectation for the investment to provide income. One of the biggest risks associated with long-term investments is volatility, the fluctuations in the financial markets that can cause investments to lose value.
- *Short-term purchases:* Short-term investments are typically held for one year or less. Generally, there is not a high expectation for a return or an increase in value. Typically, short-term investments are purchased for the relatively greater degree of principal protection they are designed to provide. Short-term investment vehicles may be subject to purchasing power risk — the risk that your investment's return will not keep up with inflation.
- *Trading risk:* Investing involves risk, including possible loss of principal. There is no assurance that the investment objective of any fund or investment will be achieved.
- *Options Trading:* The risks involved with trading options are that they are very time sensitive investments. An options contract is generally a few months. Clients should be aware that the use of options involves additional risks. The risks of covered call writing include the potential for the market to rise sharply. In such case, the security may be called away and the account will no longer hold the security. When purchasing options there is the risk that the entire premium paid for the option can be lost if the option is not exercised or otherwise sold prior to the option's expiration date. When selling ("writing") options, the risk of loss can be much greater if the options are written uncovered ("naked"). The risk of loss can far exceed the amount of the premium received for an uncovered option and in the case of an uncovered call option the potential loss is unlimited.
- *Trading on Margin:* In a cash account, the risk is limited to the amount of money that has been invested. In a margin account, risk includes the amount of money invested plus the amount that has been loaned. As market conditions fluctuate, the value of marginable securities will also fluctuate, causing a change in the overall account balance and debt ratio. As a result, if the value of the securities held in a margin account depreciates, the client will be required to deposit additional cash or make full payment of the margin loan to bring account back up to maintenance levels. Clients who cannot comply with such a margin call may be sold out or bought in by the brokerage firm.
- *Counterparty Risk:* The risk that the other party to an agreement will default or fail to perform its contractual obligations. In an options contract, counterparty risk is the risk to the option buyer that the option writer will not buy or sell the underlying as agreed.
- *Foreign Investment Risk:* Investments in foreign securities may be riskier than U.S. investments because of factors such as, unstable international, political and economic

conditions, currency fluctuations, foreign controls on investment and currency exchange, foreign governmental control of some issuers, potential confiscatory taxation or nationalization of companies by foreign governments, withholding taxes, a lack of adequate company information, less liquid and more volatile exchanges and/or markets, ineffective or detrimental government regulation, varying accounting standards, political or economic factors that may severely limit business activities, and legal systems or market practices that may permit inequitable treatment of minority and/or non-domestic investors. Investments in emerging markets may involve these and other significant risks such as less mature economic structures and less developed and more thinly-traded securities markets.

Criminal or Civil Actions

RFA and its management have not been involved in any criminal or civil action.

Administrative Enforcement Proceedings

RFA and its management have not been involved in administrative enforcement proceedings.

Self-Regulatory Organization Enforcement Proceedings

RFA and its management have not been involved in any self-regulatory organizational enforcement proceedings that are material to a Client's or prospective Client's evaluation of RFA or the integrity of its management.

Item 11: Code of Ethics, Participation or Interest in Client Transactions and Personal Trading

Code of Ethics Description

The affiliated persons (affiliated persons include employees and/or independent contractors) of RFA have committed to a Code of Ethics ("Code"). The purpose of our Code is to set forth standards of conduct expected of RFA affiliated persons and addresses conflicts that may arise. The Code defines acceptable behavior for affiliated persons of RFA. The Code reflects RFA and its supervised persons' responsibility to act in the best interest of their Client.

One area which the Code addresses is when affiliated persons buy or sell securities for their personal accounts and how to mitigate any conflict of interest with our Clients. We do not allow any affiliated persons to use non-public material information for their personal profit or to use internal research for their personal benefit in conflict with the benefit to our Clients.

RFA's policy prohibits any person from acting upon or otherwise misusing non-public or inside information. No advisory representative or other affiliated person, officer or director of RFA may recommend any transaction in a security or its derivative to advisory Clients or engage in personal securities transactions for a security or its derivatives if the advisory representative possesses material, non-public information regarding the security.

RFA's Code is based on the guiding principle that the interests of the Client are our top priority. RFA's officers, directors, advisors, and other affiliated persons have a fiduciary duty to our Clients and must diligently perform that duty to maintain the complete trust and confidence of our Clients. When a conflict arises, it is our obligation to put the Client's interests over the interests of either affiliated persons or the company.

The Code applies to "access" persons. "Access" persons are affiliated persons who have access to non-public information regarding any Clients' purchase or sale of securities, or non-public information regarding the portfolio holdings of any reportable fund, who are involved in making securities recommendations to Clients, or who have access to such recommendations that are non-public.

RFA will provide a copy of the Code of Ethics to any Client or prospective Client upon request.

Investment Recommendations Involving a Material Financial Interest and Conflict of Interest

RFA and its affiliated persons do not recommend to Clients securities in which we have a material financial interest.

Advisory Firm Purchase of Same Securities Recommended to Clients and Conflicts of Interest

RFA and its affiliated persons may buy or sell securities that are also held by Clients. In order to mitigate conflicts of interest such as trading ahead of Client transactions, affiliated persons are required to disclose all reportable securities transactions as well as provide RFA with copies of their brokerage statements.

The Chief Compliance Officer of RFA is Timothy McMullen. He reviews all trades of the affiliated persons each quarter. The personal trading reviews ensure that the personal

trading of affiliated persons does not affect the markets and that Clients of the firm receive preferential treatment over associated persons' transactions.

Client Securities Recommendations or Trades and Concurrent Advisory Firm Securities Transactions and Conflicts of Interest

RFA does not have a material financial interest in any securities being recommended. However, affiliated persons may buy or sell securities at the same time they buy or sell securities for Clients. In order to mitigate conflicts of interest such as front running, affiliated persons are required to disclose all reportable securities transactions as well as provide RFA with copies of their brokerage statements.

The Chief Compliance Officer of RFA is Timothy McMullen. He reviews all trades of the affiliated persons each quarter. The personal trading reviews ensure that the personal trading of affiliated persons does not affect the markets and that Clients of the firm receive preferential treatment over associated persons' transactions.

Item 12: Brokerage Practices

Factors Used to Select Broker-Dealers for Client Transactions

RFA will recommend the use of a particular broker-dealer based on their duty to seek best execution for the client, meaning they have an obligation to obtain the most favorable terms for a client under the circumstances. The determination of what may constitute best execution and price in the execution of a securities transaction by a broker involves a number of considerations and is subjective. Factors affecting brokerage selection include the overall direct net economic result to the portfolios, the efficiency with which the transaction is affected, the ability to effect the transaction where a large block is involved, the operational facilities of the broker-dealer, the value of an ongoing relationship with such broker and the financial strength and stability of the broker. RFA will select appropriate brokers based on a number of factors including but not limited to their relatively low transaction fees, reporting ability, execution capability (speed and accuracy), financial stability and reputation, access to markets, technology and reporting platforms, quality of client service and availability of investment research and other brokerage services. RFA relies on its broker to provide its execution services at the best prices available. Lower fees for comparable services may be available from other sources. Clients pay for any and all custodial fees in addition to the advisory fee charged by RFA. RFA does not receive any portion of the trading fees.

RFA will recommend the use of Charles Schwab & Co., Inc. or Fidelity.

- *Research and Other Soft Dollar Benefits*

The Securities and Exchange Commission defines soft dollar practices as arrangement under which products or services other than execution services are obtained by RFA from or through a broker-dealer in exchange for directing Client transactions to the broker-dealer. Although RFA has no formal soft dollar arrangements, RFA may receive products, research and/or other services from custodians or broker-dealers connected to client transactions or "soft dollar benefits". As permitted by Section 28(e) of the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, RFA receives economic benefits as a result of commissions generated from securities transactions by the custodian or broker-dealer from the accounts of RFA. RFA cannot ensure that a particular client will benefit from soft dollars or the client's

transactions paid for the soft dollar benefits. RFA does not seek to proportionately allocate benefits to client accounts to any soft dollar benefits generated by the accounts.

A conflict of interest exists when RFA receives soft dollars which could result in higher commissions charged to Clients. This conflict is mitigated by the fact that RFA has a fiduciary responsibility to act in the best interest of its Clients and the services received are beneficial to all Clients.

- *Brokerage for Client Referrals*
RFA does not receive client referrals from any custodian or third party in exchange for using that broker-dealer or third party.
- *Directed Brokerage*
Clients who direct brokerage outside our recommendation may be unable to achieve the most favorable execution of client transactions as client directed brokerage may cost clients more money. For example, in a directed brokerage account, you may pay higher brokerage commissions because we may not be able to aggregate orders to reduce transaction costs, or you may receive less favorable prices. Not all advisors require their clients to direct brokerage.

Aggregating Securities Transactions for Client Accounts

RFA is authorized in its discretion to aggregate purchases and sales and other transactions made for the account with purchases and sales and transactions in the same securities for other Clients of RFA. All Clients participating in the aggregated order shall receive an average share price with all other transaction costs shared on a pro-rated basis. If aggregation is not allowed or infeasible and individual transactions occur (e.g., withdrawal or liquidation requests, odd-lot trades, etc.) an account may potentially be assessed higher costs or less favorable prices than those where aggregation has occurred.

Item 13: Review of Accounts

Schedule for Periodic Review of Client Accounts or Financial Plans and Advisory Persons Involved

Account reviews are performed quarterly by the Chief Compliance Officer of RFA, Timothy McMullen. Account reviews are performed more frequently when market conditions dictate. Reviews of Client accounts include, but are not limited to, a review of Client documented risk tolerance, adherence to account objectives, investment time horizon, and suitability criteria, reviewing target allocations of each asset class to identify if there is an opportunity for rebalancing, and reviewing accounts for tax loss harvesting opportunities.

Financial plans generated are updated as requested by the Client and pursuant to a new or amended agreement, RFA suggests updating at least annually.

Review of Client Accounts on Non-Periodic Basis

Other conditions that may trigger a review of Clients' accounts are changes in the tax laws, new investment information, and changes in a Client's own situation.

Content of Client Provided Reports and Frequency

Clients receive written account statements no less than monthly for managed accounts. Account statements are issued by RFA's custodian. Client receives confirmations of each transaction in account from custodian and an additional statement during any month in

which a transaction occurs. Performance reports will be provided by RFA at client appointments to Clients with assets under management.

Item 14: Client Referrals and Other Compensation

Economic Benefits Provided to the Advisory Firm from External Sources and Conflicts of Interest

RFA receives additional economic benefits from external sources as described above in Item 12.

Advisory Firm Payments for Client Referrals

RFA does not compensate for Client referrals.

Item 15: Custody

Account Statements

All assets are held at qualified custodians, which means the custodians provide account statements directly to Clients at their address of record at least quarterly. Clients are urged to carefully compare the account statements received directly from their custodians to any documentation or reports prepared by RFA.

RFA is deemed to have custody solely because advisory fees are directly deducted from Client's accounts by the custodian on behalf of RFA.

If RFA is authorized or permitted to deduct fees directly from the account by the custodian:

- RFA will provide the Client with an invoice concurrent to instructing the custodian to deduct the fee stating the amount of the fee, the formula used to calculate the fee, the amount of assets under management the fee is based on and the time period covered by the fee;
- RFA will obtain written authorization signed by the Client allowing the fees to be deducted; and
- The Client will receive quarterly statements directly from the custodian which disclose the fees deducted.

Item 16: Investment Discretion

Discretionary Authority for Trading

RFA requires discretionary authority to manage securities accounts on behalf of Clients. RFA has the authority to determine, without obtaining specific Client consent, the securities to be bought or sold, and the amount of the securities to be bought or sold. Client will authorize RFA discretionary authority as stated within the Investment Advisory Agreement.

RFA allows Clients to place certain restrictions, as outlined in the Client's Investment Policy Statement or similar document. These restrictions must be provided to RFA in writing.

The Client approves the custodian to be used. RFA does not receive any portion of the transaction fees or commissions paid by the Client to the custodian.

Item 17: Voting Client Securities

Proxy Votes

RFA does not vote proxies on securities. Clients are expected to vote their own proxies. The Client will receive their proxies directly from the custodian of their account or from a transfer agent.

When assistance on voting proxies is requested, RFA will provide recommendations to the Client. If a conflict of interest exists, it will be disclosed to the Client. If the Client requires assistance or has questions, they can reach out to the investment advisor representatives of the firm at the contact information on the cover page of this document.

Item 18: Financial Information

Balance Sheet

A balance sheet is not required to be provided to Clients because RFA does not serve as a custodian for Client funds or securities and RFA does not require prepayment of fees of more than \$500 per Client and six months or more in advance.
